

#### NORTH HAVEN CELEBRATES RETIRING THEIR MORTGAGE

North Haven Board and North Haven Auxiliary held a Mortgage Burning Tea at the Health Centre on April 26th. North Haven has been open since 2000 and recently paid off the mortgage.

Tom Jensen, chairman of the board and a driving force behind the planning and building of North Haven spoke to the gathering and outlined how this facility came to be. In his remarks he said, in part:

"A sum of \$300,000 was obtained from the old hospital's funding and with the support of Larry Backlund and Mike Rudnicki, \$40,000 was obtained from the RM of Torch River. Charlie Philpott threw in \$40.000 in stock. Fundraising was still \$200,000 short but plans and approvals went ahead. Pinecrest Lumber assured us it would work out and went ahead with construction. Eighteen guarantors signed the mortgage at the Prince Albert Credit Union and construction was completed in 2000. These people had faith in the project and are now free of their obligation. They were: Lorne Butterfield, Carl Berlin, Merle Chamberlain, Terry Chamberlain, Morris Davyduke, Marion Downes, Shirley Godin, Roni Jean Grunerud, Tom Jensen, Maurice Kirby, Hugh King, Margo Marshall, Colin Paul, Alden Paul and George and Alice McCrea. Smeaton and District Care Home Co-operative Ltd was set up with officers Tom Jensen, Roni Jean Grunerud, Margo Marshall, Carl Berlin and Leonard Nakonechny."

Since opening in 2000 North Haven has cared for over 100 seniors and has provided employment in the district. It has been a great success!

Thank you to everyone who attended this event and to those who provided lunch and donated towards upkeep costs. Thanks to PA Co-op for the "Burning the Mortgage" cake.

#### ge 6 LOCAL FASTBALL PLAYER HOPING TO IMPROVE ON 2015 CANADIAN BRONZE MEDAL

This August the Bantam National Fastball Championships will be held in Owen Sound, Ontario. Fifteen year old Weirdale resident Cory Krawec, son of Carmen and Larry Krawec, is confident that his Astros team will be there. The Astros finished with a Bronze Medal at last year's Canadian Championship hosted in Prince Albert. Along with his Canadian Bronze medal, Cory's' team has won four Provincial and two Western Canadian Championships.

At age seven, Cory began playing fastball with the Weirdale Steelers. At the Squirt level he started playing developmental ball with ADFO in Prince Albert and has continued to play with the Astros team every year. At the age of eight, Cory developed a love for pitching after working with local pitching coach Larry Korolischuk and continues to attend pitching clinics with the former National Men's Softball Pitching Coach Don Bates. As one of the four pitchers on the team, Cory also plays infield. Having a local team in Weirdale was instrumental in Cory's' desire to play at a competitive level. In 2006 a group of local parents in Weirdale and area, became organized and initiated a fastball organization.

Weirdale became the home base due to the facilities. After two years of learn to play as the Weirdale Hawks (named by local players), the Steelers formed and organized teams joined the Prince Albert Minor Softball League. The Hawks and Steelers have continued since. The Weirdale Steelers were named after the late Ron Haydukewich. a welder by trade, and a strong supporter of Fastball in our community. Since the renewal of fastball in Weirdale and surrounding communities, the Steelers have produced a number of local male and female players that have gone on to participate in Provincial, Western Canadian and Canadian Championships. But most importantly, the Steelers have allowed children of all ages to learn and enjoy the sport of fastball at a local level.

In 2018, Prince Albert will be host to the Junior Men's' World Men's Fastball Championship. Cory will be eligible to try out for this National team. Cory recognizes that it would take a huge amount of work, talent and dedication



to make such a team. He also knows that eleven players from Prince Albert and area who have played with the Astros have made the U21 national team in the past so such a goal can be achieved. What Cory also knows is that Fastball can be played well beyond the teen age years as men's' leagues are strong in Saskatchewan and he will always be able to play a sport that he truly enjoys.

#### HERITAGE HOMES PHOTOGRAPHED by the late Dan MacDonald of Choiceland



**CECIL FLANDERS HOMESTEAD:** Cecil Flanders was born in Oakville Ontario. In 1903 Cecil moved with his family to a farm at Avonlea SK.

Cecil married a lady from Scotland by the name of Davena Cochrane in 1924. In 1930 Cecil filed on SW -19-52-17 in the Choiceland district. For ten years, the family would work on proving up the homestead in the summer months and spending the winters in Avonlea. In 1940 the family made their final move to Choiceland.

The family came by car but traded it for a tractor. A platform was built on the back of the tractor for transportation. Cordwood was sold from clearing the land. The farmyard had a collection of every imaginable type of farm animal. Cecil passed away in 1954. Davena moved to Choiceland where she became the caretaker of the restroom for eight years. She also assisted the Telephone Office in Choiceland.

The land today is farmed by Lawrence Kawa.

#### KAZNER MADRY HOMESTEAD

Kajner Madry was born in 1902 in the village of Boxti in Poland. He emigrated to Canada in 1927 at the age of 25 years.

He boarded a "settlers" train to Winnipeg which took 14 days, and then on to Bruno SK. The railway fare to Bruno cost \$5.00.

In 1928 Kajner worked on the construction of the Nipawin Bridge. In 1930 Kajner worked with The Pas Lumber Company.

Kajner saved enough money to buy the homestead NE 20-52-17 W2, northeast of Choiceland. His first year of taxes on the quarter was \$7.50.

He built a 14 by 18-foot house that he called his "shack". The house pictured here is this home. In 1962 Kajner put up a 6-volt wind generator for a power source to modernize his home. His means of transportation was a tractor. His first tractor was a McCormick Deering , bought in 1952. His next tractor was a Farmall-C.

He loved to make homemade beer and the neighbours were willing to sample it. He remained a bachelor all his life. Kajner sold his land in 1967 for \$6000 and at that time the taxes were \$95.00.

Kajner Madry spent his retirement years living at the Smeaton Hotel. The date of his passing is unknown. Today Kajner's land is farmed by David Smith.



Dan MacDonald passed away in 2000, but his photographic record of homestead homes are a valuable reminder of past history in the Choiceland district. 35 of Dan's photos have been enlarged and are displayed in the foyer of the Choiceland Museum. 
