DRESSLER, Muriel Pauline - Eldest child of Carl and Esther Lindbergh, was born May 27, 1932 in the Brockington district of Saskatchewan. She passed away peacefully at the age of 84 years on September 26th at Pineview Lodge in Nipawin. She was baptized in Melfort and confirmed at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Snowden in 1955. Pauline grew up in the Choiceland area, attending schools at Blue Fox and Elkridge. She worked as a homemaker, then as a cook at Smeaton Hospital and finally at Kirkby Bakery in Nipawin. At this time she met her future husband Richard Dressler; they married on July 10th, 1952 and settled in the Snowden district. They lived there until retirement and moved to Nipawin in 1990. During their 53 year marriage they raised five children and were foster parents for over 20 years. At the church she held many positions in the Sunday School and Ladies Aid at St. Paul's in Snowden, St. Mark's in Choiceland and Zion Lutheran in Nipawin. After Richard's death in 2005 Pauline moved to Pioneer House in Nipawin, When her health began to fail she moved to North Haven in Smeaton and finally to Pineview Lodge. Family was a big part of her life. She loved to get together with her siblings, for visits and large family suppers. She also looked forward to her children and grandchildren visiting. Pauline loved gardening and growing flowers. Pauline was predeceased by her husband Richard in 2005, infant son Larry in 1965, her parents and numerous in-laws. She is survived by daughter Marleen (Les) White and children Clinton (April), Carla (Dallas) Rusnak and Warren (Karyn Cunningham); son Mervin (LeeAnn) Dressler and children Dan (Erin) and Jena (Jesse) Tufts; daughter Doris (Terry) Akister and children Sarah (Tony Meredith) and Michelle (Jordan) Douglas; daughter Gladys (Barry) Whitrow and children David, Jamie-Lynn (Trevor) Edwards, and Jonathan; son Robert (Dawn) and children Alyson and Brad. Also 11 great grandchildren, sisters Geraldine Adelman, Eileen Albinet, Beatrice Wouters, Dianne Mason, Doreen Neuls and brothers Lorne Lindbergh, Fenton Lindbergh and Lyle Lindbergh, also brothers-in-law, sisters-in-law, cousins, nieces and nephews. 
SMEATON LIBRARY


THE CHURCHES AT JANOW CORNERS

Three miles south of Meath Park is all that remains of a thriving community, Janow Corners. There are two churches and their attached cemeteries. This was the site of the original Meath Park and their first school was called Janow. The name Janow came from the home village in Poland of Zydor Bajcar. A large number of Ukrainian and Polish settlers took up homesteads as early as 1906 in this area.

They formed their first school in 1914 and it opened with 16 pupils, all of which started in grade one then progressed from there to the higher grades. School was closed during the coldest months; the teacher was paid \$200 annually. By 1921 there were 40 pupils. Enrollment increased every year until they were bused to Meath Park in 1958.

When the railway was built east to Nipawin in 1929, they bypassed what was called Meath Park and a community sprang up three miles north which was called New Meath Park. The original Meath Park was called Old Meath Park but this created a lot of confusion for mail delivery and so on. So Old Meath Park took up the name of their school, Janow and added Corners to make it Janow Corners.

Pretty much all that remains are the two Catholic Churches, one Ukrainian and the other Polish.





The first church built, in 1917, is the church pictured below. One church served the Ukrainian community and the other the Polish members. The bell at left was remounted and dedicated in 2009 on the grounds of the church above, Sacred Heart of Jesus. Oddly the bell has the name "Maria" embossed on it. In the early days if there was a need to call everyone together, it is said that Frank Wlosek walked the half mile to the church and rang the bell which was heard for miles.

To the credit of the community, both churches, their grounds and cemeteries are well kept.











TRAVELS WITH TERRY: **VERMONT USA**by Terry Zabek

Vermont is one of the smaller states directly south of Quebec. It is known as "the green state" because it is probably 75% covered with trees —maple, beech, oak, birch, hemlock, sumac, pine and spruce.

The Appalachian Hills (Mountains) run up the spine of the state, with lots of rock, little lakes, rivers and covered bridges.

In fall the colours are stunning; unfortunately I was there a little too soon. However, it was still beautiful. There are little picturesque towns and villages, small farms and acreages hidden among the valleys and hills. The farms are mainly dairy. Vermont is famous for its specialty cheeses and for maple syrup.

My friends, Ross and Norma Wiesen, took me to a white granite quarry near Barre, called "Rock of Ages". It is the largest in North America and has been in operation for over 200 years. Their granite memorials and statues are numerous throughout the States and Europe. The nearby Hope Cemetery, covering 65 acres, is filled with these pure white memorials, an awesome sight. They range from the luxurious huge figures, angels and columns, to the comical. One fellow had his favourite armchair carved on his memorial—RIP.

I saw only a small part of this small state but I can understand why it is attractive to tourists and famous people retiring there.

Lily Kuzniar's Story - Wartime

Lily is a Dutch war bride in her early nineties who lives in Snowden where she feeds the birds and some very fat cats. This is her story:

I was 16 years old and in high school in 1940 when the war started. At 17 I finished school and had an office job for a while until I signed up for a nine-month crash course in nursing. Each time you took a test you got a stripe; I had 3 stripes. I worked then for the Red Cross. We did all the work of a nurse, sometimes on the streets; I saw a woman hit by shrapnel and she died right there. We looked after injured soldiers from all countries, but not Germans.

Four months after the liberation, on September 13th.1945. I met Stanlev Kuzniar. He was biking back to his barracks after visiting his brother Bruno, and I was hitchhiking to Warsveld where my post was. I was billeted at a hotel that had been badly bombed, and it was quite a distance away, maybe 20 miles. He offered me a ride on his bicycle, and because it was so far, we would sit on the side of the road to rest and talk. When we arrived at my hotel he said he'd like to date me and that he would come and meet me under the large oak tree near the hotel on his next day off. Well I wasn't going to go stand out there, but I watched out the window. I said to my girlfriend, "Gee, I think he's here." We started dating and spent a lot of time talking. He told me about his three brothers but never told me about Canada. I had four brothers and no sisters.

I could understand English quite well, but some words I didn't know; like I didn't know what 'sweater' meant! I don't understand why in Canada you don't learn languages. In Holland you took French in Grade 3, German in grade 5, and English in grade 7.

Well we got married on December 28^{th} that year.

We were suffering very much in Holland, we had no clothing, no food, and our shoes had holes. A neighbour of mine made me a gray coat out of a Canadian army blanket. She used the black stripes on the back of the coat and on the trim of the pockets. This picture was taken the day after we were married as we were on the way to send a telegram to his parents to let them know we had got married.

Stanley left for Canada on January 13th of 1946 and I arrived in Regina on July $1^{\rm st}$ the same year.

Apparently he wrote a lot of letters from Canada, but they were sent by ship so didn't come regularly - I received 6 or 7 in one batch much later. I wrote to him regularly also.

I was given her name because the plans were for me to be a boy and they had chosen "Billy" for a name and it did not suit. So I was quickly named Tena Mary after my dad's mother, Her family, the Olsons, never left the USA.

One year my sister and I traveled to Lake Preston in central United States and we saw the original homestead, There was a large family of girls but only one boy, John.

As years went by we kept in touch with these cousins and eventually they came to Alberta for a large cousins reunion. It was a fantastic time for everyone!



WHO IS TENA? (with notes from one of her friends):

Tena grew up in Garrick and attended school to grade ten in Garrick and completed high school in White Fox while looking after her grandmother. She became a teacher and taught in MacDowall where she married Roy Bannerman and had two sons. She now has six grandchildren and lives in Prince Albert, having been widowed at a young age.

She lived for a time in Wainwright Alberta when her mother required care.

Tena was named Citizen of the Year in PA for her work with the Lions and CNIB. She was also very active with the Alliance Church while living in MacDowall and while she still drove.

She is a good friend and a good citizen.

HERITAGE HOMESTEADS IN THE CHOICELAND AREA




Dan MacDonald passed away in 2000, but his photographic record of homestead homes are a valuable reminder of past history in the Choiceland district. 35 of Dan's photos have been enlarged and are displayed in the foyer of the Choiceland Museum. SIGURD ROANG HOMESTEAD

Sigurd Roang was born in Norway. He came to Canada in the 1920's, settling around Assiniboia. The language barrier was difficult but he managed to find work repairing tracks for the CPR.

Sigurd married Della MacDonald in Assiniboia while working around there.

In 1937, like so many others, Sigurd headed north and filed on NW8 –53 –18 W2 in the Snowden area. The family moved shortly. Eight children would be raise on that land.



Sigurd preferred hunting and fishing to farming. Farming was never his thing but he did it because that's what people did to survive in the north.

The family lived on a lot of porridge and potatoes. Meat was scarce unless you could catch it in the bush.

Eventually wanting more education for the kids and finding survival on the farm too tough, the family moved. Nipawin became their new home and where Sigurd and Della would live out the rest of their lives.

Today the land is farmed by Joe Shaddow.

BILL BAERWALD HOMESTEAD

Bill Baerwald was born in 1915 in Leader, Saskatchewan.

In the 1930's Bill worked on farms around the Cherry Ridge district, and in Manitoba mines.

In the 1940's Bill came back to Choiceland to help his brother-in-law, Ole Fenrich, farm. He also ran a butcher shop in Choiceland.

In 1950 Bill and Helen bought NW 26–52–18 W2 and farmed for a few years. This house pictured was their home. Bill continued to have many different jobs: driving fuel truck, caretaker for the school, and driving school bus were some of them.

Hockey and curling were high on his list of priorities. Hairdressing kept his wife Helen busy. Bill passed away suddenly at age 65. Helen would continue to live in Choiceland for many years.

The Baerwald land is owned by Karen and John Rouse.
