# Page 4 MEMORIES OF SMEATON

Dennis Young lives in Airdrie AB (hard to say if he is retired as he is a busy person). He was an RCMP officer in Saskatchewan for five years, serving in Smeaton, Buffalo Narrows, La Loche, Ile a la Crosse, Nipawin, Creighton and Rosthern. He went on to various careers, including a stint as Economic Development in Lynn Lake MB. In photo far right Dennis is going through his files regarding RCMP seizure of weapons from unoccupied homes during the flood at High River in 2013.

Here are his memories of Smeaton and area:

Floyd Rogers sends me your newsletter every month and I share it with a friend of mine who grew up on a homestead in Snowden. Floyd was stationed in Smeaton with the RCMP. I was stationed in Smeaton from April to October in 1968.

I took the picture bottom right from the top of the radio tower at the RCMP Detachment.

The other picture is of me and John Diefenbaker during the his election campaign stop in 1968. He arrived by helicopter. He asked me to drive him to the school. He delighted the grade five class with stories. When he asked me where I was from, I told him I was from a little town in Ontario and that he wouldn't know where it is. He asked me for the name of my home town. When I told him, Bancroft, he rhymed off about ten people he knew there. I was sent to Smeaton right out of training in Re-

gina. Bob Crissal was the Corporal and I was the

only Constable. I lived in barracks at the back of the detachment office. I answered the phone late one night and a man told me he had run into a 'jumper' with his car. I had to ask him what a 'jumper' was. I had hunted deer every year since I was 13 in Ontario but no one in Ontario called them jumpers. Next some lads in town took me

up the Hanson Lake Road to fish walleye (which I called pickerel) at the Puskwakau River. Along the way we stopped at a creek to watch the fish run. The boys called them 'snakes' but all I could see were northern pike in that creek. So began my training about life in Saskatchewan.



# THE FALLOON BARN


Herb Falloon was born in 1873 in St. Sylvestre Quebec. He went off to seek his fortune in the Klondike Gold Rush in 1901. He climbed the Chilcoot Trail, barged Lake Laberge, and ended up dredging in Nome Alaska. He kept a diary of his adventures but it isn't known if he struck it rich.

He began farming at Strasbourg SK in 1903 where he married Mildred Stiles and began a large and interesting family. He took out a homestead near Smeaton in 1929 (SE 16-52-20). He moved the family to this property in October of 1930. The barn shown at right was built in 1930 or 1931, as was the large house to accommodate their family. Gib Falloon (youngest son, now in his late 80's) says the house originally had a normal peaked roof but was changed to long dormers to provide a girls' and a boys' bedroom upstairs, as there were equal numbers of each.

Both buildings no longer exist, more the pity. Fortunately, the Falloon family has flourished and they get together frequently.

#### CONFESSIONS OF AN EAGER SCRIBBLER PART 3

In 1989 I retired after 33 years as a teacher. I had also got out of farming a few months earlier and found myself with an opportunity I had spent decades waiting for. I picked up a pencil and began to write.

I began a book-length project right away: a satire about a makebelieve scientific study of the Canadian prairie farmer, his occupation, lifestyle, character, habits and more. It was intended to be funny (well, I thought it was), yet with a ring of truth about its subject.

It didn't take me long to finish the manuscript and I sent it to two or three publishers, who, for some strange reason did not see the literary genius in it that I did. I decided to give up, temporarily, on book writing and concentrate on columns. To my joy and amazement one of the first submissions I made, to CBC radio, was accepted. I wrote and narrated 28 columns for CBC in 1990 and 1991, using much of the material from my unappreciated book. I would travel to the network's Saskatoon studio to do three or four of those at a time.

These were for CBC Saskatchewan, but one got onto the national network as well, because on statutory holidays CBC stations across Canada take turns doing programs for the whole country. 1990 was CBC Saskatchewan's turn on Thanksgiving. I happened to be in Saskatoon at the time and got a call giving me just a brief time—about two hours I believe—to do a Thanksgiving story for the Morning Edition. I hurriedly scribbled one about fowl suppers in Saskatchewan and using my Aunt Clara's typewriter, which was in such disrepair (I'd left mine at home) my son Doug had to keep moving the carriage back by hand as I typed, I submitted a mangled manuscript. My brother Lanny was working on a Caterpillar tractor in the Northwest Territories at the time; he turned on his radio and was

startled to hear a CBC announcer remark about a Terry Chamberlain column that had just been aired across Canada.

My first print column was in Rural Roots in 1991 and it continued to appear there regularly for the next 25 years, concluding last fall due to illness (yes, the paper's administrators got sick of me). They appeared in the Saskatoon Sun, a Sunday paper, for 10 years, and in an upstart farm paper Agworld News for the two years of its existence. A few were used as articles for Western People magazine and Folklore magazine.

The columns dealt, often in lighthearted mood, with the unexpected, sometimes bizarre and sometimes frustrating events of life, rural life in particular, and many shared my views on various social issues. One--a rant against the tendency of health inspectors to prevent small rural communities from using donated homemade food in the canteens of curling rinks, skating rinks and other fundraising venues, a valued tradition in our area since pioneer days—brought more phone calls and letters (this was pre-email) than for any other column, some scolding me for my backward attitude, but most in

staunch support, including at least one other paper requesting permission to reprint it.

By the late 1990s pressure (including from wife Esther, who is very good at pressure) began to revive my longlost dream of producing a book. More on that later.


THE WEDDING QUILT STORY:
In 1938 my mom, Mary Neufeld married Abe N.



Bergen in the Lost River District southwest of Nipawin. The family and district women made quilts for newly married couples, embroidering their names and a flower on squares of flour sacking. In those days flour was sold in cloth bags. Back then when a woman married it seems they lost their given name and they all became "MRS". Some of the squares took a while to get done; Mom's Grandma put 1942 on hers. She must have been busy but what's the rush? In those days marriages were meant to last! And it did, for 56 years until my dad's passing.

The first few years of this marriage my folks worked in the bush in Ft a la Corne, cutting railroad ties by hand; they lived in a wee shack, certainly not a place to use this nice quilt. I can recall as a young child living in tents and all kinds of shacks in the mountains of Alberta and central British Columbia, still no place to use this beautiful quilt. I can't remember this quilt ever being on a bed. I guess by the time they got a real house it was out of style, so it lived mostly in suitcase or trunk till I inherited it. I decided to revive this guilt as the hand work was just too nice to toss out. I researched the names but mostly I remember those people, and the stories about them. I must pass these stories on now while I have my wits about me!

Now this quilt has a new life; it will be on the bed in my guest room, it will be used, and who knows who it will get passed on to — I guess time will tell.

## CHOICELAND UNITED CHURCH

**The Past:** Some information about the church (from the history of Choiceland and district, *Log Cabin Tales and Changing Trails*)

In the 30's church services were held in several of the school districts in the Choiceland area. Students ministers and ordained ministers used to travel around the district by horse and buggy, on horseback or even on foot to conduct services. In September of 1945, Reverend Rae Allan, stationed at Smeaton, commenced holding services in Choiceland every third Sunday, first in the Public School, later in the hall, and then in the restroom basement. A church board was formed for the purpose of establishing a building fund for a church building.

A lot was purchased in 1947 and in 1949 a building was purchased from Jim Smith of Crockon Hill District. The building had been built by the community, with a grant from the United Lutheran Mission, to be used as a church for the community. The building was moved, a basement was excavated and on November 19, 1950, the first service was held. 1956 saw basement renovations, and in 1956 the front of the church was erected. In 1963 the CPR donated a bell and a steeple was built to hold the bell.

**The Present:** Now with the declining membership of the church and the aging of our population, in October 2016 the congregation made the difficult decision to cease worship at the end of June 2017 and to list the church building and lot for sale.

We invite the community to share your memories of the church and church activities and to join with us in giving thanks for the Christian witness of this congregation when we gather for our final worship service on June 23, 2017.
